

Year In Review 2025




Youth

Through the Youth Action Team, Teen Court and E-Sports, FRN staff mentored over 100 6th-12th graders.

Camp SOAR staff mentored 62 9-12 year older campers throughout the 6 week program, with 10 junior counselors and 7 counselors in training.

Through a grant with The Greater Kanawha Valley Foundation, the FRN purchased;

- 99 furniture items
- 671 items of clothing
- 550 household items

for 134 unique individuals, including 76 children.
